Setting Your New Dog Up For Success

Create a Safe Space

Set up a cozy area where your dog can relax, such as a covered crate
or a soft bed in a quiet, low-traffic spot like a bedroom or a calm
corner of the living room. This gives them a place to retreat and
observe their new environment at their own pace.

House Training Basics

 Take your dog outside frequently and reward them with a tasty treat when they go in the right spot. Positive reinforcement helps them learn where they should do their business.

Manage Their Environment

- Use baby gates to block off areas you don't want them to access or to give them space if they feel overwhelmed by visitors.
- Remove rugs or items that could be tempting to chew on or have accidents on.
- Keep treats in convenient spots around your home to reward good behavior and to "trade" if your dog picks up something they shouldn't have.

Help Them Feel Secure

If possible, avoid leaving your dog home alone for the first 48 hours.
 This helps them adjust to their new environment with you there for reassurance.
